

## NURSE VIETTY, SHYOGWE, RWANDA

When we visited Rwanda earlier this year we were able to see first-hand the difficulties faced by Nurse Vietty in his daily work. The clinic has 34 beds - 20 of which are dedicated to maternity.

Vietty was far too busy to meet with us during the day but came to see us in the evening to give us an overview of his work. 75% of cases presented at the clinic are for malaria but the adult malaria medication had been used up so they were prescribing a double dose of the children's drug. The monthly medication bill for the clinic is approximately £3000.

The staff also oversee a smaller clinic which deals with family planning. All pregnant ladies are tested for HIV, and those presenting as positive are treated immediately, and as a result babies treated when born generally test negative by the age of 2. Nurse Vietty is also a qualified midwife.


## NURSE BRIGITTE, GIKOMERO, RWANDA
