

Prossy in Kimwanyi Clinic. Uganda

As a result of the support offered to Kimwanyi clinic, Uganda, with the provision of beds & mattresses, Amosquito nets, and medicines as well as the funding to enable nurse Prossy to be employed, the clinic has been lifted by the government to grade 4. This entitles them to a Doctor, a luxury they have never enjoyed before. Pastor Patrick Ssimbwa tells us:

"This is due to the performance and impact in the community of the clinic. Our area for referrals has been increased allowing more people access to medical help.

The Good news is that we received an Inspection Team from the Ministry of Health and it commended greatly the support you offer to our clinic."

Of course this increases the demands made on the staff and resources, making the continued employment of Nurse Prossy even more vital.

Since our last update Prossy has given birth. After a short period of maternity leave she has now returned to work and continues to serve the local community.



Vietty in Shyogwe Health Centre. Rwanda

Vietty continues to concentrate on preventative medicine, specifically immunisation and hygiene advice. Rev. Jean Pierre Rukundo informed us:

"The work Viety is doing in Shyogwe health Centre has contributed to the reduction of infant mortality and malaria which was one of the most disturbing disease in the area. Every month Viety helps around 600 people in immunization service and preventive medicine."

Vietty says: "The most joyful experience in my work is to see when women come for immunization while they are pregnant and very tired and the following days you meet them again smiling when they come for immunization of their babies."

Brigitte in Gikomero Health Centre. Rwanda

Brigitte focuses on health testing, family planning, ante natal care and the care of under 5's.

In March 37 women came for ante natal care, all received health screening. 70 attended family planning and 14 babies were safely delivered.

In addition 1050 patients attended the clinic for primary care and a very high number, including 137 children, were suffering respiratory infection..

Brigitte requests your prayers for: Additional staff, as they currently have to work every day.

Also for her husband who is now in UN military mission for peace keeping in the Republic of Central Africa.
